 address the areas of rebuke.
- Why should we value God's testing? What is the purpose of being tested?
- Why were the churches in today's text tempted to compromise their beliefs? In America, why is it often easy for the church to blend in with the world? What happens when Christians' lifestyles are indistinguishable from the world? In what areas of your life are you indistinguishable from the world?
- What is the difference between compromise and complacency? How are they often intertwined? Are you coasting through life, or are you living and enduring faithfully?
- Were any of these churches written off by Christ? What did He tell them to do to be restored?
- When you consider the eternal rewards in store for the church, how do they change the way you view and value this world? What steps do you need to take to focus less on material things and more on Christ?
- How does John's description of the throne in heaven and the One who sits on it give a picture of the glorious power and sovereignty of God?
- Why should seeing God for who He truly is drive us to dissatisfaction with complacency?
- Why does Jesus' death and resurrection make Him worthy to take the scroll and open its seals?
- How can we encourage one another to continue steadfastly in the faith?

Revelation 6-11

Review

- The theme of Revelation is "gospel". How does that understanding change or influence how you *interpret* this book? How does that understanding change or influence how you *apply* this book to your life?
- Why is the purpose of Revelation not to promote speculation? What does speculation about times and interpretations achieve?
- In Revelation 6:2, 4, 8; 7:2; 8:2, 3; 9:1, 3, 5; 13:5, 7, 14, 15, permission is given by God for all that occurs in these chapters, indicating that He is sovereign. Think of a trial that you have experienced or aren experiencing in your life. Does your response to trials indicate that you believe God is sovereign? What does it practically look like to trust in the sovereignty of God, especially in the midst of a trial?
- How do you respond to sin in your life? Are you broken over your sin? Do you hate your sin? Are you urgent to confess it? Or do you have a laissez-faire attitude towards sin? What does your response to sin indicate about your relationship with God?
- Christians are secure on earth in the midst of tribulation. Discuss your definition of "security." How does
 your definition of security align with Revelation 6-7 as believers are persecuted for the faith and facing
 great trials on earth? Is Christ your security, or are you depending on people or things (both of which are
 temporary) to provide that sense of protection and well being in your life?
- How does knowing and understanding God's Word fuel prayer and proclamation? Can you pray and proclaim rightly when not grounded in the Word? Why not?
- · How do the three-words, "Our God wins," summarize the Book of Revelation?
- Read the word of the twenty-four elders in Revelation 11:17 and consider the missing words, "who is to come." How does knowing that His Kingdom will indeed come—fully and finally—fuel your mission?

PRAYER GUIDE FOR WEEK THREE

Review

- Who is it that sits on the throne to judge all humankind?
- · How does a person know if their name is written in the book of life?
- The "second death" and "first resurrection" are mentioned in this passage. What definitions of these terms are provided in Revelation 20 itself (see Rev. 20:5-6, 14-15)?
- Even though we do not know for certain which view of the Millennium is correct, why is it important to think through what you believe on each of the issues regarding the timing, length, and location of the Millennium?
- If you knew the day and time of His return, how would you live? Is that an accurate description of how you are currently living? What regrets do you not want to have when He returns with regard to family, the lost, friends, time, money, etc.?
- We often sing and talk about mansions, personal health, personal comforts, and other material aspects of heaven. What does it reveal about us that we think of material things as the best parts of heaven? What does it reveal about our view of God?
- Scripture is clear that there will be those in the church who confess God but show no evidence of a changed life. Why should this be a warning to us personally and to us as we proclaim the gospel?
- What hope do we have regarding the world to come? In what ways are you placing your hope in this present world? Take time to repent. In what ways are you placing your hope in the world to come?
- How has this study of Revelation fueled hopeful obedience in your own life? Why should the study of Revelation motivate believers towards greater faithfulness?
- Revelation views the church through the eyes of her Groom. Do you have the same attitude and commitment to the church as Christ? Why or why not? Why is commitment to the local church important?
- Who in your normal rhythm of life needs to know Christ as Lord and Savior? How can you encourage, share, and invest in them this week?
- How are you part of the advancement of the gospel to the nations?
- How would you summarize the message of the book of Revelation? What was John's intent in writing this epistle to its original readers? How is this book's message applicable to readers today?
